SCRIPTURE & LESSON

PASSAGE (NIV): ACTS 2:1-13

Read the following excerpts as shown (NIV translation), or read from your chosen Bible translation:



Acts 2:1-13

When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them.

Now there were staying in Jerusalem God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven. When they heard this sound, a crowd came together in bewilderment, because each one heard their own language being spoken. Utterly amazed, they asked: "Aren't all these who are speaking Galileans? Then how is it that each of us hears them in our native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya near Cyrene; visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judaism); Cretans and Arabs—we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!" Amazed and perplexed, they asked one another, "What does this mean?"

Some, however, made fun of them and said, "They have had too much wine."

Questions for Children

1. This miracle is wonderful because it happened right after Jesus ascended. And during his life, most miracles came through him personally, though his disciples were witnesses. Now the disciples would be able to have lots of power themselves. What miracle did they immediately perform? *A: They were able to speak about God and Jesus so the people around them could understand, even though they spoke in many different languages.*

2. In the weeks and months that followed, the disciples used their newly-found power in the Holy Spirit often. What do you think they did with it? **A. While this isn't part of the text, some of the miraculous events that surrounded the disciples ought to be shared.** The disciples healed people. They were able to tell everyone about Jesus in words the people could understand. They were able to hear or more easily figure out what God wanted them to do next. Some even broke free of being jailed by the help of angels.

3. Have you ever wanted a lot of power? If so, what did you want to do with it? How are you alike or different from the disciples in this way? If you had spent the three years of Jesus' ministry with him, how do you think you would be different?

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TEACHER'S MIGHTY MESSAGE

There is an interesting saying in our culture: "People are motivated mostly by romance and by power. More often, they are motivated by power." Granted, this a very worldly saying that has nothing to do with God's presence. But think when you play a game. Everyone wants to be CAPTAIN. Many people don't just want to be in a play or a stage performance. They want the LEADING ROLE. Or they want to be the SOLOIST.

One little girl was a baton twirler. She wasn't the captain of the squad. But in the huge Fourth of July parade, the captain had a sprained ankle and couldn't perform. The little girl was SO GLAD, because SHE got to give the commands to the rest of the squad. Did she stop and feel sad that her teammate was in pain and disappointed? Probably not for long.

We can all be like this. It's part of the human condition to want power. While God has the biggest power in heaven and on earth, it makes the OTHER person more important than it makes us. It teaches us to build up OTHERS and not ourselves. God's power is about LOVING more than LONGING to be noticed.

The morning of Pentecost, the Apostle Peter spoke to 3,000 people clearly, in miraculous languages so that they could understand about the Kingdom of Heaven, where we will ALL be built up, noticed, and quite powerful.

Here is what Apostle Peter later said about power, having become one of the most powerful men of all times: Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. -1 Peter 5:6





LISTEN TO THE SPIRIT OBSTACLE COURSE/RACE

Blindfold one child and let the other be the Holy Spirit who leads him around with power! As children avoid stepping in harm's way, they'll realize what it was like for the apostles before and after the Day of Pentecost.



MATERIALS:

- blindfold
- building blocks or Legos
- two chairs

Preparation

- 1. Clear a playing area that's big enough to play the game below.
- 2. Throw the blocks around the floor so there is enough room to step in between them. Put the chairs in strategic places.




INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Blindfold one student. Have another take his hands.
- 2. The seeing student should lead the blindfolded student slowly, himself walking backwards, through the blocks without letting the blind student step on any. He can give commands and describe what is below before the blind student steps.
- 3. If the blind student steps on a block the round ends and it's another pair's turn. If they reach the designated finish line, they win.

Conclusion

Why are we playing a game with blindfolds while talking about the power of the Holy Spirit? The person leading the way was a little like the Holy Spirit, weren't they? They can see. They know what's coming up next. They can tell us the way.

When the Holy Spirit speaks to us, it can sound a bit soft and even unclear. We have to listen carefully so we can follow God's path! When we listen and are willing to follow another source of power, the Holy Spirit will bring us to the best place possible!

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

PRINTABLE CRAFT

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MATERIALS:

- Day of Pentecost Paper Whirligig Craft (one page)
- White Paper or Cardstock (we recommend cardstock)
- Coloring Utensils
- Scissors
- Glue
- Cardboard (IMPORTANT to reinforce the whirligig)
- Sharp Piercing tool (needle, toothpick, skewer, pen)
- String (about three feet per student)



PREPARATION:

- Print one copy of Pentecost Whirligig Printable Craft for every two students, ensuring that each student has two circles.
- To save time or for younger student, you may wish to prepare the cardboard rounds ahead of time, making sure to have one per student.

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Color images on page as desired
- 2. Carefully cut out two circles per student
- 3. If not already done , trace and cut out cardboard round using whirligig circle as a guide
- 4. Glue Whirligig Circles on each side of the Cardboard Round
- 5. Poke two holes at guide points and then enlarge the holes until they are large enough for string to pass through.
- 6. Thread the string through one of the holes in the Whirligig, then thread the other hole through the back side and tie closed.
- 7. To make whirligig move, hold two ends of the long loop of string with the whirligig perpendicular and in the middle. Using one hand, twist the string around so that the string winds up on itself, then pull back slightly. The whirligig should start spinning!

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This Week We Learned About ...

Pentecost is when we see the power of the Holy Spirit that Jesus had promised in the gospels. The disciples are praying, and they and their friends hear a mighty wind and see tongues of fire above them. Once outside, people from afar can hear them speaking in their own languages. Let's look at the passage together to see what we can learn about the power of the Spirit.

Questions for Kids:

3. What were the people hearing that made them so bewildered?




