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LESSON OVERVIEW

TOWER OF BABEL MIGHTY MESSAGE

This Lesson on the Tower of Babel from Genesis 11 will teach students about haughtiness and how not to let your ambition come from vanity. Rather, it should come from love of God and each other. It's a great thing to build up the Kingdom of God on earth. It's quite another thing to build to the kingdom of God! The main character in the Tower of Babel story, Nimrod, great- grandson of Noah, did a lot of great things. But none of it should have inspired him to think he could build a tower to heaven. And what? Barge on in? God welcomes all who want to come into his kingdom. His love is the ladder, as this lesson will show.

SCRIPTURE & LESSON

EXCERPTS OF GENESIS 10 & 11: (NIV)

Read the following excerpts as shown (NIV translation), or read from your chosen Bible translation:



GENESIS 11:1-9

¹Now the whole world had one language and a common speech. ²As people moved eastward, they found a plain in Shinar and settled there.

³ They said to each other, "Come, let's make bricks and bake them thoroughly." They used brick instead of stone, and tar for mortar. ⁴ Then they said, "Come, let us build ourselves a city, with a tower that reaches to the heavens, so that we may make a name for ourselves; otherwise we will be scattered over the face of the whole earth."

⁵ But the Lord came down to see the city and the tower the people were building. ⁶ The Lord said, "If as one people speaking the same language they have begun to do this, then nothing they plan to do will be impossible for them.⁷ Come, let us go down and confuse their language so they will not understand each other."

⁸ So the Lord scattered them from there over all the earth, and they stopped building the city. ⁹ That is why it was called Babel—because there the Lord confused the language of the whole world. From there the Lord scattered them over the face of the whole earth.

GENESIS 10:8-12: ABOUT NIMROD, WHO BUILT THE TOWER

⁸ Cush was the father of Nimrod, who became a mighty warrior on the earth. ⁹ He was a mighty hunter before the Lord; that is why it is said, "Like Nimrod, a mighty hunter before the Lord." ¹⁰ The first centers of his kingdom were Babylon, Uruk, Akkad and Kalneh, in Shinar. ¹¹ From that land he went to Assyria, where he built Nineveh, Rehoboth Ir, Calah ¹² and Resen, which is between Nineveh and Calah—which is the great city.

Questions for Children about the Tower of Babel

1. The Tower of Babel is the next story in the Bible after Noah's Ark. Nimrod, who built the tower, is Noah's great-grandson. This is the only Bible story about Nimrod. Many think he was haughty and arrogant. You've heard the rule of thumb about something we consider good manners: Don't invite yourself to somebody else's house. What does that saying have to do with Nimrod and the Tower of Babel? *Nimrod was inviting himself into God's house. God did not invite him to build a tower.*

2. According to Jewish history, God had told the people to spread out after the Flood. One reason was likely sanitation. These early people, of around 2400 BC, did not have the devices we have today to make sewer water clean, and they did not have anything like antibiotics. How would building a city with a Tower have broken God's edict? *It would have brought thousands of people together in close proximity who could spread germs.*

3. Verses 6 and 7 have God saying this: "If as one people speaking the same language they have begun to do this, then nothing they plan to do will be impossible for them. 7 Come, let us go down and confuse their language so they will not understand each other." It sounds almost like God was trying to thwart progress. But how is that not true? What might God have been trying to save and protect mankind from? We already discussed the spread of contamination. *God certainly allowed cities later in history, and he allows skyscrapers today. He wanted to save mankind from making choices based on ego. Nimrod didn't build the city to please God, but almost to compete with God. He was trying to see how cool he could be, instead of how loving, faithful, honest, just, and fair.*

TEACHER'S MIGHTY MESSAGE

Before building the Tower of Babel, Nimrod had built other cities. He built Babylon, which became one of the most evil places in history. He built Nineveh, which also became idolatrous and was where Jonah the prophet preached after he was swallowed by a great fish 2,000 years later. By the time he planned the world's first skyscraper, he must have thought he was really, really cool.

The story took place around 2400 BC. But it applies to today! How many of you have ever seen a show-off get injured while trying something? Have you ever seen somebody try to get attention and it backfires? They end up needing stitches, a cast, or a trip to the emergency room? *Take any stories.*

The Apostle Peter said in his first epistle, Chapter 5, Verse 6, "Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time." Nimrod didn't want to wait for God's timing, and he certainly didn't want to be humble.

Nimrod could have built huge and prosperous farms across the land to help people get their start. He could have done things God's way. And God would have exalted him by having him written up in the Bible the same way as Noah who came before him and Father Abraham who followed him. He would have been known 5,000 years later as a hero to mankind.

Instead, he is known as a showoff who stumbled and fell.

It's easy to show off. It's easy to get attention for a short time like Nimrod did. It's much harder to wait for God's timing. But let's remember that God has better things in store for us than we could ever dream - if we humble ourselves and serve others.






PRINTABLE CRAFT

POP-OUT TOWER OF BABEL



MATERIALS:

- White paper or cardstock
- Coloring utensils
- Scissors



INSTRUCTIONS:


Step 1: Print out Tower of Babel Craft Template on white paper or cardstock. (Note- we included a KJV & NIV version of this craft- so pick whichever translation you prefer.) Step 2: Color as desired.


Step 3: Fold the page in half as shown along the midline of the tower.

Step 4: While keeping the page folded in half, cut along the horizontal lines of the tower as shown in the example pictures.

Step 5: Reverse the fold of the narrow horizontal bands of the tower as shown and stand up the tower in a V-shape so that the tower "pops out".











THE HARDER THEY FALL

Teach kids the value of humility while letting them build their own Towers of Babel. The team who builds the tallest wins the race (but it will require more thought and going more slowly)!



MATERIALS:

- Building blocks, at least 40
- Timer, such as the one on a smartphone



Sort out the blocks so that two teams have fairly equal piles and sizes of blocks.




INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Divide the class into two teams. If you have an odd number, divide by ability as opposed to equal numbers of teammates.
- 2. When you say, "Go!" teams may start building.
- 3. Be sure to give this edict: The team that has even one block fall is finished working and must patiently allow the other team to continue.
- 4. The team with the highest tower after 60 seconds wins.
- 5. Complete several rounds and declare an overall winning team.

CONCLUSION

It's easier to have an accident, such as the ones with falling blocks, when you are worrying about beating others or getting applause for yourself, isn't it? If we had built these towers as a testimony to God's love, how much prettier would they be and how many fewer accidents would we have? Let's remember to be "Noahs" and not "Nimrods" as we follow God throughout our lives.



FACTS ABOUT THE TOWER OF BABEL & NIMROD



Genesis



Likely around 2400 BC

Biblical historic
events
surrounding:

Noah's Ark and the Great Flood took place around 100 years earlier. It is recorded in Genesis 6-9.

The story of Father Abraham becoming the father of Israel took place around 500 years later. It is recorded in Genesis 11-25.

As the Tower of Babel falls in Genesis 11, it is the story immediately between these two great tales.

Bloodline of Nimrod, builder to the Tower: Nimrod is the son of Cush, the grandson of Ham, the great-grandson of Noah.

Nimrod is not in the bloodline that leads all the way to Jesus. Noah's son Shem carries that bloodline.

There are 13 generations between Adam, son of God, and Nimrod.

Facts about Nimrod: At first, Nimrod was a hunter who was pleasing to the Lord. We are not sure when he turned to ambitious architecture. But that likely had to do with his departure from worshipping the Lord, as the cities he built were never historically known for worshipping God.

Nimrod first built Babylon, Uruk, Akkad, and Kalneh, in Shinar. They are in the south of the early known world, near where the Garden of Eden was.

He then moved north, closer to where the Ark had landed, into what became Assyria. There he built Nineveh, Rehoboth, Ir, Calah, and Resen.


